Here are some other ways to gain experience and knowledge.

Online resources

There are some free online resources available that will give you a taste of what working in healthcare is all about:

- Brighton and Sussex Medical School has created a <u>free virtual work experience</u> <u>course</u> that explores several different medical specialities.
- The Royal College of General Practitioners has created an interactive platform called <u>Observe GP</u> that highlights the many different aspects of working in primary care.

Volunteering

Volunteer in your spare time, if you can. All forms of voluntary work can provide helpful work experience. Consider volunteer work in the NHS or working with other people in a caring or service role, and in particular with people who are ill, disabled or disadvantaged is preferable.

Voluntary commitments to community groups (for example groups related to the work of churches, mosques and temples, or other groups such as Scouts or Guides) and online community support groups may also provide valuable experience of taking on responsibility, dealing with people and communicating effectively. Remember: it is what you learn about yourself, about other people and about how effective care is delivered and received that counts. What you did is only a small part of the story; it is how you communicate what you learnt which matters.
